In a conference that explores meanings of the Anthropocene within music studies, this roundtable discussion broadens the scope to ask after reckonings with the Anthropocene in the academy. Taking the form of an open-ended discussion between participants from different corners of the humanities and sciences, the roundtable will take its lead from issues proposed by participants, together with the following broad questions:

- To what new forms of scholarly discipline, interdisciplinarity, and indiscipline do anthropogenic effects on regional ecologies and world systems give rise?
- What remains undone and unthought within the university, as a site of knowledge production (in relation to broader mechanisms and industries of knowledge production) about earth systems and climate?
- What role (if any) do music scholars have to play in the unfolding epistemological drama of the Anthropocene? Or does the Anthropocene toll a slow yet inexorable death knell for disciplines that fix and predetermine their objects (music, literature, sound, visuality, even culture) in advance of the politics of nature?
